Justiciability of the Right to Education Following the 2013 Report of the Special Rapporteur

The goal of this event is to showcase the justiciability of the right to education, both according to proposals presented by the Special Rapporteur in his latest report, and also by examining case law in the field. Over the past two decades, important jurisprudential progress has been made in many nations, including the United States, South Africa, Colombia, Spain, Brazil, India, and many others. Indeed, the efficacy of the right to education depends heavily on judicial or quasi-judicial controls such as these, as indicated by the Special Rapporteur in his text. As we know, the justiciability of economic, social, and cultural rights (ESCR) presents one of the principle barriers to their realization. However, within the suite of ESCR, the right to education occupies a central role. Hermeneutically, it is the most fully developed of the ESCR. Moreover, it is recognized as a tool for accelerating progress toward Millennium Development Goals 2 and 3 and the priorities laid out in the Education for All initiative. Finally, the right to education occupies a privileged place within the framework of development policies in the post-2015 context.
